Dear Friends,

What an amazing year we've had! Every day at our school, I'm blown away by the incredible things our students are doing and by the ways we keep growing together as a community. With that said, I think that this coming year is going to be even better!

We have some big plans for our upcoming school year. Our community is growing! We anticipate our student body expanding to over 350 students in the coming academic year. As more students join us, we're adding additional positions in English and Math. We will also be welcoming a part-time Praise and Worship Leader to our team, who will be helping out with our weekly masses and student retreats. We believe this will add even more depth and richness to our spiritual life together.

Tolton offers many dual credit classes through MACC and Truman University. In the classroom, we're continuing to expand our dual credit class offerings this coming year to include Psychology and Philosophy. This gives our students even more chances to earn college credits.

In addition to this, we're making some changes to how we grade, too. The Diocese of Jefferson City will be making a diocesan-wide shift to a 10-point grading scale. This change will benefit Tolton specifically in that it will help our students remain even more competitive and in the best position possible when they're applying for college admissions and scholarships. Alongside this, we're changing our grading to a semester-based system. Instead of dividing the year into quarters, we'll now have two longer grading periods. This is intended to more accurately reflect a student's overall performance, accommodate large scale projects, and provide an opportunity for grade improvement throughout the semester.

When you read through the following pages, I hope you feel connected to all the wonderful things happening here. It's a joy to see our students grow, learn, and succeed, and we're grateful to you for being a part of this journey with us.

Thank you for your belief in our mission and your continued support. Here's to another fantastic year ahead!

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2022-2023 Class Retreats - Seeking Freedom In Christ

The Tolton Retreat Committee dove into a new adventure this year by bringing in a well recognized retreat team, the Marianist Outreach Retreat Experiences (MORE) group, to lead our student retreats. We were blessed to have the MORE group lead retreats for each of our freshmen, sophomore, junior and senior classes. The theme was "Freedom in Christ", and it focused on real-life scenarios and applications for how to have, and choose, freedom in Christ.

This information was presented through several different platforms including skits, video clips, and personal testimonies throughout the day. Each presentation was then followed by time for small group chats to process and discuss the content, as well as how to apply it to their lives moving forward. Even with the heavy topics that were discussed (peer pressure, body image, emotional health and well-being, etc.), the students remained engaged and gave their full attention during the more serious parts of the day. However, like in years past, we couldn't let the day pass without throwing in some fun and games. Inclusion and team-building were promoted through games such as "God Says" (similar to "Simon Says"), and Musical Hot Potato. The MORE team's focus was on laughter and the retreat days were filled it.

In addition to the games and content, there was also time for personal reflection during Adoration and Reconciliation, and each retreat concluded with Mass. The junior and senior classes also had the opportunity to partake in a "forgiveness rock exchange activity" that allowed them the opportunity to exchange rocks with a peer that they felt they needed to reconcile with. There were also designated spaces to exchange rocks if the students felt the need to reconcile with a family member or peer that was not present, or if they were holding onto something personally that they wanted to release. This exercise was a great segue into Reconciliation, and was a very powerful and moving time. You could sense tension being lifted, see relationships being restored, and feel the power of the Holy Spirit moving.

Through a survey given to all students following the retreats, the overwhelming majority felt that it was insightful. They were glad to have the opportunity to discuss real-life issues that may not directly pertain to school, but certainly affect their lives as a whole. This reflects Tolton's motto of Spirit, Heart, Mind and Body. We are hopeful that the MORE team will be able to continue to work with our students in years to come as they have many other retreat programs to share and more wisdom to offer.

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

TOLTON ITALY TRIP 2023

During Spring Break, Mr. Henderson escorted 55 Tolton students, parents, and teachers on a 10 day "Grand Tour of Italy". The group touched down in Milan and headed to Verona to see Juliet's balcony and sample their first gelato and cappuccino. Next they ventured on to Venice, where they toured St. Mark's Basilica and Square, as well as the Rialto Bridge, and enjoyed a gondola ride through the Grand Canal.

They also visited the historic cities of Bologna and Florence in the region of Tuscany, the birthplace of the Renaissance, sampling food that even most Italians would rank as some of the best in the country. Junior student Gwen said, "I'm a big Renaissance Art fan so seeing all the Botticelli paintings in Florence and the Sistine Chapel... everything, just everything. It was a great experience for learning about other cultures."

In the quiet mountainside town of Assisi, the birthplace of St. Francis and St. Clare, the group visited the beautiful respective churches and tombs of each of the saints. In the city of Naples, they toured the ruins of ancient Pompeii, before heading further south to the picturesque seaside town of Sorrento. The culmination of the trip was a comprehensive tour of the Eternal City, Rome, which included the Vatican Museum, St. Peter's Basilica, the Colosseum, the ruins of the Roman Forum, the Pantheon, Piazza Navona, the Trevi Fountain, and the Spanish Steps. Our Tolton travelers did not miss the Gelateria Della Palma with its 150 flavors of gelato, which must be seen, and tasted, to be believed!

When asked about her most memorable moments of the trip, junior student Margot replied, "Mass on Palm Sunday in Florence. The whole mass was in Latin so I couldn't understand it but it was so beautiful. Everyone was passing palm branches and the singing was beautiful. And Rome at night was also one of my favorite times. We had time to sit at the fountains, enjoy gelato, just hang out and experience Rome. It was more young people like us. It felt like a truly genuine experience."

While the trip was fast paced and busy most days, the good food, abundance of history and Italian culture, and wonderful company was enjoyed by all!

Faith and Science

When you step into Mrs. Baratta's Theology class - Faith, Science, and Reason Theology - you step into a special space where students, typically seniors, are asking some big questions and having open and honest faith and science-based discussions about them. When asked about the class, there is no hesitation on how much they enjoyed the class and want to discuss it. One student said, "I get to think about other options and opinions along with my own beliefs. For example, evolution, the Big Bang, free will, animal versus human brains and so many more topics! I got to see how science and faith can go together." Another stated, "You don't always stop and really think about some of these big topics or how those topics work with your faith. It really made me think, it really made me consider things."

To continue to expand on their studies, and in turn teach their students, Tolton teachers Dr. Hausam and Mrs. Baratta attended the Notre Dame Foundations Seminar which is part of the McGrath Institute for Church Life's Science and Religion Initiative this summer. The goal of the conference was to equip high school teachers with the knowledge and tools to enhance the dialogue between science and religion. They spent a week on Notre Dame's campus attending lectures by scientists, philosophers, and theologians, and participating in collaborative discussions. The presenters were all experts in their area and truly passionate about integrating faith, science, and reason.

Mrs. Baratta stated that the Catechism of the Catholic Church offers the following perspective on faith and science: "Though faith is above reason, there can never be any real discrepancy between faith and reason. Since the same God who reveals mysteries and infuses faith has bestowed the light of reason on the human mind, God cannot deny himself, nor can truth ever contradict truth. Consequently, methodical research in all branches of knowledge, provided it is carried out in a truly scientific manner and does not override moral laws, can never conflict with the faith, because the things of the world and the things of faith derive from the same God. The humble and persevering investigator of the secrets of nature is being led, as it were, by the hand of God in spite of himself, for it is God, the

conserver of all things, who made them what they are."

Yet, the idea that faith and science must be in conflict is increasingly prevalent and accepted. The Faith, Science, and Reason Theology elective aims to address this perceived conflict. Students study the work of both scientists and theologians on topics such as epistemology, cosmology, evolutionary biology, and consciousness and discuss the consequences for their own worldview. This class is a chance for students to examine their own beliefs and assumptions so that they are better able to understand, explain, and defend their worldview.

For example, when considering questions about the beginning of the universe, students studied scientific theories such as the Big Bang Theory (first proposed by Catholic priest Georges Lemaître!), calculations of the probability of a life-supporting universe, the creation accounts in Genesis, and some writings by Pope John Paul II and other Saints on creation.

"My hope for this class is that by exploring the complexities underlying these questions, we can move past the false dichotomy of 'science versus religion' and instead start to develop a fruitful dialogue between the fields," says Mrs. Baratta.

There was not one student who didn't have something insightful to say about this class. Molly said, "There would be times it was a weekend and I'd find myself thinking about what we talked about in class. And not just thinking about it but I'd be totally lost in thinking about it. One time I realized, wow, this is really occupying my thoughts right now."

One student stated, "There are topics in our faith that you just go along with because that's what you've been taught your whole life. But this is more to the why and not only that but it gave me reasons and answers to be able to defend it on another level." Aden shared, "This is the most interesting religion class I've ever taken. I thought about so many things. I learned so much." Another student summed it all up sharing, "I would definitely take the class again... and I'm a senior!"

Mrs. Baratta finished her thoughts by saying, "I am very thankful to Dr. Everett for making this class happen. I am looking forward to incorporating new material from the seminar to make next year's class even better!"

Last Spring, I was honored to be offered the position of Fr. Tolton Catholic Athletic and Activities Director. Coming off several successful years as a department, I enthusiastically accepted the position eager to help build upon past successes with a vision towards the future. Having just completed another successful year, I am happy to report that the future of our Athletic and Activities department is as bright as it has ever been!

While we do not base our success as a department purely on accolades won by our students, coaches, and teams, the 2022-2023 school year was filled with several such accolades. In total, our Athletic Department finished the year

with an amazing eight teams finishing in the Final Four, with two more missing out by only one game. Tolton ended up with Individual State Champions in Girls Golf, Boys Wrestling, Girls Swimming, and Girls Track (in 4 different events in Girls Track). There were two new State records set by Tolton Athletes in Girls Track. Our Boys Cross Country, Girls Cross Country, and Girls Soccer teams all finished as State Champions. Over a dozen Tolton Seniors have signed on to continue their Athletic careers at the Collegiate level. In addition, our Athletic Department finished second in the MaxPreps Cup standings which recognizes the top overall Athletic Departments in each state. This is the third Consecutive year we have finished in the top 3 as an Athletic Department.

In addition to the successes of our Athletic Department, we had a great year of Activities as well. Our Scholar Bowl team continued to compete at a high level, we had two wonderful music concerts and were able to hire a new Theater Sponsor and put on a successful Spring Play. Our clubs continued to grow, with our service organization Key Club reaching its highest numbers in school history and an overwhelming majority of our student body participating in at least one Club or Activity.

As we look towards the future, there is a lot to be excited about. We will once again be welcoming a large Freshmen class who have already begun having an impact on our programs through summer participation. We have invested in our storage facilities to help each program have a usable space for their uniforms and equipment. We have added HUDL cameras to our Gym and Football/Soccer fields to help coaches with their programs and to allow us the ability to more easily livestream our home contests. As our programs have grown in numbers, we have added coaches to ensure we are well staffed in all our programs. We are bringing back the Tolton Catholic Live Club, adding a STEM Club, and a Student Host Club that will help us create an even more hospitable atmosphere at our home contests. We have brought back Youth Summer Camps to introduce the next wave of Blazer athletes to our programs and we have taken steps to better compensate our coaches for the time they put in with our student-athletes.

As I have stated previously, my goal for the Athletics and Activities Department is for us to be great at everything. Whether it is winning a State Championship in Soccer, putting on a music concert, or setting up a new fish tank in the building, I take pride in seeing our students have success in their chosen sport or activity. We have accomplished so much in our school's short history, and I am excited to see what we will be able to accomplish in the future with the help of our dedicated students, teachers, staff, coaches, and all others who help make our programs great.

I am a golfer and a leader of the Alpha Phi Zeta Girls Bible Study Club. I am also a member of the Executive Council, The Hooves and Key Club.


What have you enjoyed most about the Tolton community?





ATHLETIC HIGHLIGHTS



















1. CHEER

Cheer won the Regional Championship earning the team another trip to the State Championships. This was the Cheer team's 8th Regional Championship in a row! Cheer finished 4th at the State competition.

2. CROSS COUNTRY

Both the Boys and Girls Cross Country teams finished as State Champions! Boys were the 2022 Class 3 State Champions with Quentin Hermann finishing 6th and Owen Hartline finishing 18th. Hermann's time of 16:31 is a new school record! Girls were back to back State Champions winning the 2022 Class 4 State Championship! Olivia Andrews finished 19th, Makaylin Viet finished 10th, Madison Taylor finished 8th, and Elyse Wilmes finished 7th.

3. DANCE

The Blazer Girls Dance team competed at the State Competition finishing 4th in Division 1 Pom and a 2nd place in Division 1 Jazz. The entire team qualified for Academic All-State honors! At Nationals in Florida, they came home with 5th in Jazz!

4. FOOTBALL

The Football team finished 7-3 on the season, the third best record in program history! They advanced to the first round of Districts.

5. GIRLS GOLF

The Girls Golf team finished as AAA Conference Champions, took 2nd in Districts, and finished 3rd at the Class 3 State Championships! Audrey Rischer took first place overall at State making her the first ever Tolton Girls Golfer to win the title.

6. BOYS SOCCER

Boys Soccer had a great season finishing the year with a 17-6-1 record. The team beat Fatima in the District Semifinals 2-0, but lost a 2-1 nail-biter on penalty kicks to St. Francis Borgia in the District Championship.

7. SOFTBALL

Softball finished the season at 25-12 and as District Champions, beating Centralia. The win marks the second District Title in three years for Tolton.

8. GIRLS TENNIS

The Girls Tennis team finished up its most successful season in program history with a record of 9-7. They finished with the most team wins they've ever had, and largest roster of players, in the history of the program.

9. VOLLEYBALL

The Lady Blazers finished their season with a record of 16-10-2. Senior Samantha Wright achieved over 1100 career assists and the team won the AAA Conference!

10. BOYS BASKETBALL

The Boys Basketball team had a great season making it all the way to the Final Four in back to back seasons! The team finished with an overall record of 21-11 including big wins against top teams in the state. The team finished 4th at State.

11. GIRLS BASKETBALL

The Girls Basketball team finished with a 9-16 record, making it to Round 2 of the Class 3 District 7 Championships. This win total is the highest for the girls program since the 2018-2019 season.



12. GIRLS SWIMMING

The Swim Team made State with Summer Ryan competing in the 100 Fly and the relay team of Sarah Seda, Brooke Willmeth, Lindsey Hervey and Summer Ryan with Anna Clapper, alternate, competing in the 400 Free. Lindsey Hervey competed in the 200 Free and 500 Free, taking 2nd place in the 200 and 1st place in the 500 - her third straight State 1st place finish in the event.

13. WRESTLING

Tolton sent six Wrestlers to the Class 1 State Championships with the team finishing 4th overall. Freshman Brady Narron took 6th place, seniors Justus Martin and Frank Reuther each finished 5th, sophomore Frank Hazelrigg took 2nd, and freshmen Chris Ankenman finished off an undefeated season by taking 1st place at 113 lbs.

14. BASEBALL

The Baseball Varsity team finished with an overall record of 13-9 while the JV finished with a record of 12-5, and the Freshmen team finished at 15-3.

15. BOYS GOLF

The Boys Golf season ended with a third place finish at Districts. Individually, Garrett McIntosh finished as District Champion and Andrew Fallis took 7th, qualifying both for State. Andrew took 5th place at State.

16. BOYS TENNIS

The Blazing Aces finished the season with a 17-4 record (the best in program history), finishing the season as District Champions and making it all the way to the Quarterfinals before falling one match shy of a trip to the Final Four. Brady Farnan competed at the Individual State Meet.

17. GIRLS SOCCER

With a record of 18-8-1, Girls Soccer ended their season with a 1-0 victory over Villa Duchesne to clinch the 2023 Class 1 State Championship, the first ever in program history! Ava Martin was credited with the championship winning goal midway through the second half and Goalie Rachel Tipton led the Blazer defense to a 6th straight shutout and 14th on the season.

18. TRACK AND FIELD

Girls Track finished 2nd place overall at the Class 2 State Meet. Tolton won four events: the 4x800M Relay (Olivia Andrews, Jillian Andrews, Madison Taylor, and Elyse Wilmes), the 800M (Elyse Wilmes), the 1600M (Elyse Wilmes), and the 3200M (Olivia Andrews). Elyse Wilmes 800M and 1600M times were both new Class 2 State Records. Olivia Andrews took 2nd in the 800M, Makaylin Viet took 6th in the 800M and 2nd in the 3200M. The 4x400M relay of Elyse Wilmes, Aimi Zimmerman, Madison Taylor, and Jillian Andrews took 2nd. In the 1600M, Tolton accomplished the rare feet of finishing 1st - Elyse Wilmes, 2nd - Olivia Andrews, 3rd - Makaylin Viet! Boys Track competed at the Class 3 State Meet with Lucas Boyer finishing 6th in the 200M dash and Quentin Hermann added new school records to the 1600M and the 3200M, he took home 6th in that event. In total Tolton had nine new school records this season with some being broken several times.



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

Notes from the Advancement Office



Hello friends!

Once again, the advancement team is privileged to share that we've been blessed abundantly by the engagement of so many partners in this mission of Catholic education.

To our families, benefactors, faculty and staff, clergy, and fans, we extend our heartfelt gratitude! Given their personal investments, we take the task of keeping our partners well-informed very seriously. As such, I'm excited to share a few updates!

As far as enrollment, we are nearly busting at the seams! This fall, we will welcome the largest student body in school history – over 350 Trailblazers – and have a waitlist for 9th, 10th, and 11th grades. From a fundraising standpoint, thanks to your generosity, our 2022 Trailblazer Annual Fund Drive exceeded expectations, wrapping up at 110% of goal, and our Day of Giving effort fully funded 23 different "wish list" items for our faculty and coaches. We have progress to share regarding capital projects and facilities as well...

In last summer's magazine publication, I outlined the steps that we planned to take to assess the feasibility, costs and other municipal considerations associated with upgrading our outdoor athletic facilities. Over the past year, we enlisted the services of a dedicated project manager, architects, engineers, and construction professionals to diligently refine the scope of our facility upgrades and maximize the usable ground on our campus. Mindful of costs, with careful attention to detail, we have crafted a vision that encompasses a bold transformation of our outdoor facilities. These long-awaited improvements will not only positively impact the experience for every Trailblazer family, but will also ensure ADA compliance across our campus, underscore student safety by keeping our athletes on-site for practice and game play, provide outdoor venues sufficient for commencement and community fellowship events, and provide additional revenue streams for the school since we'll be positioned to host District competitions and more home matchups.

With the blessing of Bishop McKnight, this capital effort includes the development of an exceptional 8-lane track and field pits that meet MSHSAA standards, accessible sidewalks throughout the outdoor complex, a new baseball/softball press box building, and perimeter fencing with an improved entrance to provide a secure and welcoming environment. We plan to install artificial turf on both the football/soccer field and the baseball/softball field, and install additional bleacher seating at each venue, enhancing the playing surfaces and creating a state-of-the-art experience for our athletes and fans.

We are pursuing an ambitious timeline and the project will take no less than \$7 million to complete. Our fundraising goal will reflect not only construction costs and related fees, but – to be the best possible stewards of the facility in the years ahead – will also provide for an endowment to fund ongoing maintenance.

It's difficult to convey just how transformational a facility enhancement of this magnitude would be for the Tolton community. As readers may know, Tolton Catholic was made possible only through a grassroots fundraising effort. Families who were the first to enroll their children and pay tuition were concurrently fulfilling multi-year pledges of support that allowed for the school's construction – a testimony to

their faith and sacrifice. Our earliest coaches and athletes have secured Championship Titles despite practicing and competing in rudimentary facilities – a testimony to their fortitude and work ethic. Our enrollment has grown despite not "having the best of everything" – a testament to the value of the overall educational experience we are providing for students.

While an official capital campaign has yet to publicly kickoff, it will take a similar level of commitment from our entire community to complete this project in an accelerated fashion. Our early fundraising efforts have been fruitful! In the coming months, we will be providing regular updates and opportunities for you to get involved. Together, we can ensure that our young people have access to exceptional facilities that will empower our student athletes to reach their fullest potential and maximize the student experience for all.

Professionally, on behalf of the team here at Tolton Catholic – and personally, on behalf of my children, who are all Trailblazers – I extend my deep gratitude for your steadfast support. Continuing our work together will ensure Tolton's transformative power reaches new heights.

As the name implies, this award is meant to recognize an individual for exemplary volunteer service to the Tolton Catholic community. As we've worked side by side with Randy over many years and attempted to thank him for his efforts, he always turns the conversation to focus on his pride for the school and gratitude for his sons' personal experiences as students here. In fact, that was one of the many observations offered in his nomination - that he is "an unwavering advocate for this school within the larger parish community".

His daytime hours are spent serving as a General Manager for Hillyard, but in his "spare time", he's contributed to Tolton in many specific ways. Given his professional expertise, he's selflessly provided time, labor, and materials in the annual maintenance of the school – primarily, the annual refinishing of our gym floor and deep cleaning and waxing of the school building. For many years, he (and sons Austin and Andrew) would personally handle the waxing; more recently, he's taken time to train our Tolton facilities crew on best practices to enable the school to complete this task in-house.

Randy has devoted countless hours to helping us maintain our outdoor athletic fields. He's been one of our most dependable volunteers to help mow and stripe our fields for competition play. These are incredibly time-consuming tasks (the scheduling of which can be affected by many external factors, including weather, changing game schedules, and coach preferences) and he's often had to take the reins in recruiting help from other volunteers. When others have chosen to get involved, he's taken the time to sufficiently train them how to use the various equipment. Are you noticing a theme here? He always thinks about succession planning and the long-term

sustainability of our programs. He wants our facility to be the best it can be – for the students AND for our public – and tends to it as if it was his own.

From the athletic standpoint, his service doesn't stop with pregame. He also volunteers his time in the operations booth for all home football games, expertly running the clock/scoreboard.

Randy has always gone about these tasks with very little fanfare, evidence of the selfless nature with

Giving with Intention

When Jean and Mike Jenner began talking about estate planning, they knew from the beginning there was one investment they just had to make.

At the time, their oldest son, Joe, had graduated from Tolton several years earlier. Their youngest son, Andrew, was about to begin his senior year.

"Both our sons got so much out of Tolton," said Jean. "Both had great teachers who inspired them and taught them well. Their academic experience was terrific, and they had wonderful extra-curricular experiences. Both are very knowledgeable and strong in their faith. They made great friends through Tolton – and so did we."

The Jenners decided to make an estate gift to Tolton. They placed a significant portion of their portfolio in a trust – specifically, a charitable remainder unitrust - where it will continue to grow. When Mike passes away, the money will go to Tolton.

Jean and Mike had a special request for the use of their gift. Rather than spend the money on new facilities or technology, they specifically requested that the money be used to retain quality faculty and staff.

"We think Tolton's greatest strength is its people," Mike said. "We know it's hard for private schools to compete with public schools. We'd like for that money to be used to incentivize Tolton's best people to stick around."

By the time the planned gift benefits the school, Jean and Mike both hope the funds will have grown substantially, and they encourage others who value faith-based education at Tolton to consider making a similar investment.

"The thoughtful intention behind the Jenners' gift is a blessing in and of itself," states Tolton VP and Advancement Director Jill Weimer. "Their investment dedicates funds toward a strategic priority that underscores long-term stability, high morale, and a culture of academic excellence, all of which are key in sustaining a healthy organization and a thriving school community."

"We're excited to help establish an endowment for the school that will ensure it continues to have talented teachers and administrators for years to come," said Jean.

The Impact of Planned Gifts

While planned giving encompasses many different types of "vehicles," one thing is true for all: planned gifts are an optimal example of a win-win situation, as they are mutually beneficial for donor(s) and the benefitting non-profit organization.

Clearly, planned gifts promise future funding for an organization and are critical for sustainability. This bolsters confidence and enhances the reputation and standing of the organization which, in turn, invites additional or increased investments from the organization's larger base of constituents. Such guaranteed and, often, significant support also enables the organization to maintain a growth mindset to dedicate funds to strategic priorities beyond their general operations that help the organization thrive.

Likewise, planned gifts open doors for donors. Any donor who cares deeply about an organization can impact that organization in a significant way without affecting their everyday cash flow. Planned giving is accessible to anyone who makes a will or maintains even a modest investment portfolio, regardless of their current income. Therefore, any donor can leave a legacy and take satisfaction in determining how their funds are utilized. Perhaps most significant, a well-executed planned gift has the potential to offer significant tax benefits for the donor, or for heirs.

Some of the most common planned giving vehicles include:

Bequests by Will or Living Trust:

Easily include Tolton in your will or living trust, either through a new will or a simple amendment, designating a fixed dollar amount or percentage of your estate.

Life Insurance:

Name Tolton Catholic as a beneficiary on your life insurance policy, allowing the school to receive the proceeds while providing potential estate tax exemptions for your family.

Appreciated Securities:

Gift publicly-traded appreciated securities to Tolton, receiving an income tax deduction equal to their fair market value and avoiding capital gains tax.

Retirement Account Beneficiary Designation:

Designate Tolton as a beneficiary of your IRA, 401(k), or other retirement plans, ensuring the amount passes to Tolton tax-free while avoiding income and estate taxes for your heirs.

IRA Rollover:

If you're 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ or older, make annual tax-free charitable rollover gifts of up to \$100,000 directly to Tolton from your IRA.

Gifts of Real Estate:

Make a gift of real property to Tolton, enjoying an income tax reduction equal to the appraised value of the property and avoiding capital gains tax.

Gifts of Personal Property:

Gift tangible personal property like artwork or equipment to Tolton, qualifying for a charitable deduction equal to the fair market value with no capital gains tax.

Charitable Gift Annuity:

Establish a charitable gift annuity with Tolton, providing income for life while supporting the nonprofit, and receive an immediate charitable deduction on your income taxes.

Charitable Remainder Trust:

Benefit from tax advantages and receive income for life or a specific term with a charitable remainder trust, either through an annuity trust or unitrust, ultimately supporting Tolton.

Charitable Lead Trust:

Similar to a charitable remainder trust, a charitable lead trust pays a fixed or variable amount annually to Tolton, with remaining assets reverting back to you or your family at the end of the term.

After 6 years serving Tolton, Dan Shimkus will enjoy a well-deserved retirement. We appreciate Dan's years of care for Tolton.



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
